Vicars Message

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law – Galatians 5: 22-23



On Thursday 26th of September, the PCC met up together at Foxhill retreat centre to look at our Journey so far and our future together. This day involved much celebration for what God has done this year, much reflection on the time ahead, and of course that word that may as well be an unwritten 11th commandment in most churches, "Thou shalt not discuss CHANGE"

Partly, this discussion with the PCC was absolutely not needed, as I feel blessed more than ever by a PCC that is supportive, caring, outward looking and reflective of those words from Galatians above. However, the message and theme can not be revisited enough, and I need the PCC to reinforce this message to the congregation and people around.

We here at St Michaels need to change. Our Worship, mission, ministry, structures, and use of our building needs updating and modernising ready for a new future and a new generation. This is why I write to you today, to inform you that St Michaels has this past 12 months, and will be in the future, on a journey of change. Change that to some will be very uncomfortable.

Why change? Well, the hard truth is that the Church of England and the Christian faith is in decline here in the UK. People no longer HAVE to go to church, rather it is something they can now choose to do. With this choice comes decline, with decline this beautiful building on Greenway Road which cost £1750.00 a WEEK (not a month) to run is in very real danger of closing.

The truth of the matter is that we need to change, the building needs to be modernised too in order to attract people into St Michaels in as many ways as possible. A lovely Lady said to me recently "Do you know what you need to do to build up that church?...Get a Choir!" Oh how I really wish it was that simple in 2024.

The building itself has already begun to make some changes. For example, the very outdated Choir Vestry has been stripped, repainted and is awaiting a new carpet so that we can hire this room out for both missional outreach and to assist with income.

The Meeting room will hopefully soon have a new lease of life too, with a greater focus on this being very much a community hall open to all. Again reaching into a new beginning of missional outreach and further maximising our income.

Finally, at our PCC it was discussed to make some structural and positional changes in some of our roles and functions. All of the above uncomfortable to some, trust me I sympathise with you.

Change also comes in the form of ourselves by way of giving. Sadly, it is almost always the same people time and time again doing everything to keep this place going. This absolutely has to change. The church is not a Sunday club to attend where everything is magically put together by a vicar who only works one day a week, rather, The Vicar works 6 days a week with a wonderful team of very committed (mostly retired!) volunteers, who are going above and beyond. The polite reminder here for those able bodied is that we are all the Body of Christ, all separate parts making up that one body (1 Cor 12:27). Unfortunately whilst our finances are stretched, our volunteers are working tirelessly, to a level that is not sustainable in the long term future of St Michaels. Therefore, If you can spare even the most minor financial donation or increase to our work, it would be most appreciated. If you can spare 30 minutes at the end of the service to take your turn on the coffee rota, if you can join the fundraising team, or have an idea of where you would like to fit in, even in certain roles up front, **PLEASE** do come forward.

Most of all, in relation to the above, and that word, **CHANGE**, can I ask for your prayers, your patience and for the fruit of the spirit within us all as we navigate unknown territory, making Jesus known through St Michaels in today's very challenging generation.



Walkers could lose 40,000 miles of footpaths

Walkers in Britain could stand to lose thousands of miles of rights of way, because of the sheer size of the growing backlog of applications for footpaths to be recognised and protected. The Government has set a deadline of 2031 for public footpaths and bridleways to be officially mapped. But local authorities still have nearly 8,000 applications still waiting to be processed. This has caused concern that some rights of way could be lost forever. The Ramblers, the walking charity, reckons there are about 41,628 miles of missing rights of way. They are encouraging people to track these down, in their *Don't Lose Your Way* campaign.

NO ORGANIST, NO CHOIR,.....NO PROBLEM

This is a story of Virtual reality and hymns by email, with a twist in the Tale.

For some time here at St. Michael and All Angels in Runcorn, we have had neither a Church Organist or Church Choir. The hymns and other music have been played through the Church sound system.

At the outset of our year in Vacancy, from late 2022, one of our Church members, Sue, was tasked with sourcing both hymns appropriate to the lectionary, and the music, to then send on to our sound engineer, Brian. Our regular Sunday congregation numbered around 30 to 35 during the Vacancy. Now Sue was brought up in the Methodist Church, and Methodists do like a good sing, so she was blessed with a broad knowledge of Hymns and Religious music.

In September 2023 God blessed St. Michaels with a bright, shiny new Vicar, Revd George, who came overflowing with great ideas and much enthusiasm for developing the Worshipping Community and linking in with our wider Parish residents. Monthly Sunday Café Church was reintroduced by Rev. George which in turn brought a widening of the hymn choices embracing both traditional and not so traditional songs, so this gave Sue an additional challenge! This desire for a wider choice brought another challenge. Some of the less traditional songs were not known by many of the Congregation.

Sue had a "light bulb "moment.

She invited just a few of the congregation to form a "Virtual Choir" and each week emailed them with a list of the hymns for the following Sunday, in some cases the words of the lesser-known songs and in a few cases downloads of the music. Emailing following strict GDPR guidelines of course. This resulted in at least some of the congregation being able to practice and "belt out" the hymns and songs for others to follow. Over the weeks, the aforesaid enthusiasm and great ideas for development started by Rev. George began to bear much fruit and the regular Sunday congregation has now swelled to between 55 and 60 which is remarkable. During this time, more of the Congregation have been invited by Sue to become part of the "Virtual Choir"encompassing both those who have only recently come to St Michaels to worship, and those who have worshipped in our wonderful Church for some time.

The Virtual Choir is now 34 strong, so up to 34 folk come to our Sunday service in full knowledge of the hymns and music for that service which is fantastic.

The twist in the Tale.

It is well known how daunting it can be for anyone who plucks up the courage to come to a Church, or indeed any other organisation, for the first time. However, what we have found is that as well as receiving the usual friendly St Michaels welcome, when anyone new to our Church accepts the invitation to become a member of the Virtual Choir, they immediately feel "part of the Family", receive weekly emails about the forthcoming Sunday worship, and become involved in the chatter both before and after Sunday service about the music....in some cases making suggestions for forthcoming services.

One could say the Choir is Virtually Pastoral, and great fun for all.



What's the Big Idea? - An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament: Mark

Mark is the second of the synoptic gospels, along with Matthew and Luke. Traditionally this gospel is ascribed to John Mark, a close associate of Peter. It was written for Gentile readers, probably in Rome during Nero's persecution of the church (c AD 64-7). Mark unveils Jesus' public ministry with the words: 'the beginning of the gospel about Jesus Christ, the Son of God'(1:1). The gospel provides a succinct and vivid account of Jesus' ministry, concentrating on what Jesus did rather than what He said. Mark moves quickly from one episode to another, often using the word 'immediately' which is characteristic of his gospel. For Mark, understanding the true identity of Jesus is fundamental to his gospel. Jesus asks the disciples, 'Who do people say I am?'(8:27), to which Peter replies, 'You are the Christ'. This is evident in Jesus' role as teacher, the call for discipleship and the account of lesus' death and resurrection, which occupies the last third of the gospel. A key verse which helps us to understand the nature of Jesus' mission and how we might live in the light of it is: 'Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be slave of all. For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." (10:44,45). As the Suffering Servant, Jesus gave His life on the cross, that we might know and share his love. Mark is understandably in a hurry to tell us about Jesus: the one who reveals the truth of God to us, that we might live in reality not ignorance!
