Vicars Message

Matthew 24:6-13

You will hear of wars and rumours of wars but see to it that you are not alarmed. Such things must happen, but the end is still to come. Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be famines and earthquakes in various places. All these are the beginning of birth pains.



War benefits nobody. This has been my opening statement at all remembrance day services since being in ministry and although some would argue that war does indeed benefit the oppressed, as it is the greater outcome for the greater good that matters, in the very first instance, war benefits nobody.

Sadly, we live in a time where war and the growing threat of war is more prevalent now than in recent years as Israel and Palestine, Russia and Ukraine all carry on their own conflicts whilst other countries become involved in various ways. On one hand I fear for the future of this world and for my own grandchildren, yet on another I know that God has this in hand fully.

Going back a few thousand years, we see that war (certainly in the Holy Land) is not something new and this is evident to those who visit Jerusalem as you can see clearly the various layers of brickwork and monuments destroyed by conflict. Take the city walls for example, written many times in ancient scripture about its battles, and also in more modern historic literature, evidenced by the early Jewish brickwork, underneath the Ottoman Empires Brickwork, the Crusader and more modern repairs. Jerusalem is no stranger to war.

In a couple of weeks, our focus turns slightly from the brickwork of Jerusalem to the trenches and battlefields of WW1 and WW2. Additionally, to the more modern conflicts of Afghanistan and Iraq. Yet more conflicts, more wars and more damage done. I reflect often upon war and the effects of conflict both on an international scale and more locally in our own country in recent riots.

The thing about war that hurts me the most is the children being caught up in all of this. I saw a really hard-hitting picture recently of a young child playing on her bike in what appeared to be Palestine. No green field, no friends, no sunshine, just debris, damage, and destruction. My heart bleeds for these children because let's be honest, they do not care one bit for land, wealth and political status, they just want to play on their bikes with their friends and go home for a cuddle.

My apologies for the first part of this message being quite "down" but the truth must be in the forefront always, now I want to offer you some light in amongst the darkness of War. Especially as we approach remembrance.

On this side we do not have the answers at all, though we do see Jesus words about "wars and rumours of wars" we know these things "must come to pass", my light is in Jesus Christ and his divine Mercy, a divine mercy that protects every innocent man, woman and child who dies caught up in conflict, that divine mercy who carries soldiers who have had no choice but to pull the trigger. The same divine mercy who will in the end write all of these wrongs as a thing of the past.

My light also shines through those I meet daily via general conversations, and via everyday ministry. It doesn't fail to surprise me that in amongst the world around us, in the darkness of the media doom and gloom, we have more people shining light (or ready to shine) than there are those who wish to press darkness. And this is my call to you all now.

As we approach remembrance Sunday, please do remember those who have fallen, please do wear your poppy with pride, please do pray for peace, though most of all never forget that though the conflict zones seem so far away and that the future seems like something we cannot impact, never forget the importance of becoming that light of Christ in a dark world, shining for those around. It makes no difference how old or young you are, or how heavy your personal circumstances, we can all take even the briefest moments to encourage one another.

I leave this vicars message with my own prayer for peace.

Father, in a world with so much conflict and so much threat of wars, we pray for a time when war is a thing of the past and that the future is one of peace. A time when every man lays down their arms, and every woman and child can exist and grow in safety and love. with every blessing,





What's the Big Idea? - An Introduction to the gospel of Luke

Luke is the third of the synoptic gospels. The gospel and Acts were both written for Theophilus, a Roman official, who acted as Luke's patron to ensure that his gospel was copied and distributed. It was intended for a wider audience, to help both Gentile believers and unbelievers understand who lesus is and that the gospel is intended for the whole world. Luke's account of Jesus' life and ministry can be divided into 4 main sections: the coming and early life of Jesus (1:1-4:13); Jesus' ministry in and around Galilee (4:14-9:50); His ministry (mainly teaching) on the road to Jerusalem (9:51-24:53) and His final week in Jerusalem (19:28-24:53). For Luke, the key focus is how God's plan of salvation for the world is fulfilled in Jesus. Therefore, he writes an orderly account ranging from the birth of Jesus to His ascension. He is a strong champion of the outsider. As an outsider himself (a Gentile writer in the NT) he shows how Jesus includes those who are typically seen as outsiders by the religious establishment of His day. This includes women, the poor and *sinners* (incl. tax collectors, prostitutes and shepherds!), as well as showing how Gentiles, Samaritans and Jews are all included in God's plan of salvation. Luke also emphasises the importance of prayer in Jesus' ministry and the role of the Holy Spirit. A key verse which reflects this perspective is found when Jesus encounters the tax collector Zacchaeus, 'For the Son of Man came to seek and to save what was lost' (19:10). Whenever we find ourselves on the outside of God's life and love, as Zacchaeus, Jesus comes to find us and welcome us afresh into His kingdom.

Farmhouse Supper 2024

On Saturday 21st September, St Michael's Fundraising Committee held their annual Farmhouse Supper the Church Hall. Around 70 people turned up to a marvellous buffet which was laid on, and donated by members of the committee and the congregation. We also welcomed back 'Kiwi Chorus' as our entertainment for the night singing some new songs for us and again they did not disappoint the audience. On the night we raised over £1005.





HYMN: The story behind 'To God be the Glory!'

Fanny Crosby (1820 – 1915), the American singer and musician, was blind from the age of six weeks. She married her music teacher, Alexander Van Alstyne, who was also blind. She was a prolific song-writer, and once signed a contract with a publisher to write three songs every week throughout the year. But in fact, she wrote thousands during her lifetime. Although American evangelists Moody and Sankey used this hymn on their missions, it did not become an immediate favourite. But after Billy Graham featured it in his Harringay crusade in 1954, Londoners were soon singing it on their way home, in streets and busy gueues and underground trains. When Dr Graham took it back to the United States and introduced it at his crusade in Nashville, Tennessee, it soon took its place in the group of top favourites hymns.


Oh, perfect redemption, the purchase of blood, To every believer the promise of God; The vilest offender who truly believes, That moment from Jesus a pardon receives.



Illtud - patron saint of NGOs? 6th November


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Not many people have heard of Illtud, but perhaps we should make him the patron saint of all Christian NGOs (Non-Government Organisations) who work in emergency and famine relief. Illtud did not set out to be an action hero - he was a gentle and learned abbot heading up a monastery in Glamorgan. Illtud spent his days reading the Scriptures and philosophy. Yet the year that famine struck the coast of Brittany, Illtud put down his parchments and became a man of action. Illtud issued what must have been one of the earliest 'emergency relief appeals', and was able to collect a great deal of corn. Illtud loaded this corn onto several small ships, and set off across the perilous Channel in order to save the people of Brittany. Perhaps he had in mind the words of Christ: "I was hungry and you fed me..." (Matthew 25:35) Certainly, the people of Brittany never forgot Illtud's kindness towards them: even today some Breton churches and villages bear his name. Many churches in Wales are also dedicated to this compassionate man.
